Enrollment Requirements

Applications are accepted year-round for children 3-5 years of age. A child can enter Head Start at any time throughout the year. If classes are full, the child's name will be added to a waiting list.

To start the enrollment process, call the site closest to you to schedule an application appointment. Please bring the following items with you:

- *Copy of Birth Certificate
- *Immunization Record
- *Current Insurance card
- *IEP, if applicable
- *Proof of Income (W-2s, Tax Return, SSI,
 TANF documentation, Child Support, Pay
 stubs, Unemployment Compensation)

Priority is given to families who are at or
below the Federal Poverty Guidelines. You





What is Head Start?

Head Start began in 1965. KIRPC Head Start initiated in 1997. The federally funded program is designed to foster healthy development in low-income children. KIRPC delivers a range of services, responsive and appropriate to each child and family's heritage and experience that encompass all aspects of a child's development and learning. Every program must meet the Federal Head Start Performance Standards.

Two sites at Roselawn and North Jasper have children August-June. Three sites at Winamac, Rensselaer and Goodland have children August-May.

KIRPC teachers hold an Associate's Degree, or higher, in Early Childhood Education. Teacher assistants hold a CDA or are working towards their CDA currently. All staff are trained annually in CPR/First Aid, child abuse, drug and alcohol abuse, medication administration, and several other topics.

School Readiness and Family Engagement is the focus of the program. Data days occur 3 times annually where child and family progress is analyzed and improvement goals are set for individual children, staff, classes, and for the whole program.

Children who participate will:

- Receive individualized teaching in 5 key areas: Physical Development; Social/Emotional Development; Language & Literacy; Cognition & General Knowledge; and Approaches to Learning.
- Learn through play in theme based centers in the classroom.
 Teachers use Creative Curriculum, Zoophonics, and CLASS to guide their teaching.
- Receive vision, hearing, speech, developmental, and behavioral screenings. Referrals made to outside agencies for services as needed. IEP services occur on site.
- Receive nutritious breakfasts and lunches.
- Experience their communities through field trips and special quest visitors.
- Be socially and academically ready for Kindergarten.
